Lesley Sharp, a medical anthropologist by training, is the author of five books, including *The Transplant Imaginary*, an ethnographic study of the ethical underpinnings of two highly experimental forms of non-human organ replacement, the fields of bioengineering and xenotransplantation. Her talk today draws on her current project, *Animal Ethos*, an exploration of moral thought and action in animal laboratory science. Sharp is the Barbara Chamberlain and Helen Chamberlain Josefsberg '30 Professor of Anthropology at Barnard College and Senior Research Scientist in Sociomedical Sciences in the Mailman School of Public Health at Columbia University in New York City.
